'Everyone Sang' by Siegfried Sassoon

Siegfried Sassoon wrote this poem in 1918, probably based on his own experience in the trenches towards the end of the First World War. But reading it now might also suggest parallels with what people have been doing during lockdown.

Everyone suddenly burst out singing;
And I was filled with such delight
As prisoned birds must find in freedom,
Winging wildly across the white
Orchards and dark-green fields; on – on – and out of sight.

Everyone's voice was suddenly lifted;
And beauty came like the setting sun:
My heart was shaken with tears; and horror
Drifted away ... O, but Everyone
Was a bird; and the song was wordless, the singing will never be done.
