


Book Talk

It is a novel about influence, narcissism, intellectualism, seduction, and secrets.

- 3. What does Sibyl Vane represent to Dorian? Why does he leave her? Did he really love her?
- 4. Do you agree with Wilde's statement in the preface that 'there is no such thing as a moral or immoral book'? Why/why not?
- 5. What did you think of the ending? What do you think it means?
- 6. Henry says 'Youth is the one thing worth having'. Why does he say this and do you agree with this statement?
